

NL Central Division Ballparks FAQs

What is in the collection?

Born-digital materials relating to the history and design of Busch Stadium, Great American Ballpark, Miller Park, PNC Park, and Wrigley Field are included through hyperlinks, PDF documents, images, and audio and video files.

How can I search for materials in the collection?

You can either perform a basic or advanced search. Some suggested search terms can be found on the "Home" and search results pages. On each search results page you can also refine your results. For general search tips, please check out our "Help" page.

How can I browse for materials in the collection?

The main navigation presents the option to "Browse All" or to browse by ballpark (as seen with "Busch Stadium," "Great American Ballpark," "Miller Park," "PNC Park," and "Wrigley Field"). The "Home" page also has randomly selected materials and newly added materials that you can browse as well.

How can I view the materials in the collection?

Most images, videos, and audio files can be viewed on the material's page and downloaded. Videos are available in MP4 and WMV file formats, while audio files are available in MP3 and WAV file formats. PDFs can be downloaded and viewed from a link on their page. Hyperlinked material will open the original source in a new tab.

How were the materials selected?

Materials were selected according to our Collection Development Policy, which is available on our "About" page. In sum, our collecting focus is on the history and design of ballparks in the Central Division of the MLB's National League (NL), which pertains to the following five ballparks: Busch Stadium, Great American Ballpark, Miller Park, PNC Park, and Wrigley Field.

Where do the materials come from?

All materials were found on the internet. All records have a URL link to their original source, which is accessible either through the material itself (e.g., a hyperlink) or in the "Source" field of the material's description.
